7. Sixth form update.	LD confirmed that all of the courses were offered but due to low take up some will not continue run. Currently there are 112 students who have shown an interest in joining the sixth form for September, this compares to 75 in 2018. In year 12 there are currently 8 lessons a fortnight. We hope to increase this to 9 a fortnight next year in order to provide greater curriculum time for students. The current financial model would break even if 90-95 pupils joined the sixth form. A governor asked what subjects, courses were popular / unpopular. LD psychology, physics, math's, history, English, engineerings, biology, business study, chemistry were all popular. The subjects, courses not as popular were preforming arts, music, product	



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	design, and food science & nutrition. These courses wont run. A governor asked do the courses offered change each year. LD yes so courses not running this year could run next year if take up is good enough. A governor asked is the time frame for the sixth form planning correct. LD yes and is working well.	
8. Pupil progress and achievement towards targets: update.	LD. Year 13 second mocks (student numbers 67). A*- B 42%. This is improvement on first mock result of 32%, but their target is 69%. Increase from mock one is encouraging but there is work to be done to ensure target is met. This cohort did well at GSCE, so their targets are very high. The benchmark is looking good for Summer, but there are some concerns regarding the current progress. A governor asked if these students will make the required progress. LD motivation is key and we are working hard to keep / improve the students motivation to help them make the required progress. AK the second round of mocks was helpful. There have been two MLT meetings to discuss how to best target the students who may not make the required progress. KS4. Year 11 second mocks show progress 8 estimate of -0.17 (mock one P8 was -0.59). We are confident the progress made will be positive.	Full reports on governor hub

	Year 8 currently inline with NIA, the latest data shows a drop just below 50% on target. With the work being done LD is confident the end of the year figures will be at least in line with expectations.

9. Review of ADP: progress against actions.	Priority 1 is to improve the quality and consistency of teaching, learning and assessment The area's showing progress are. A. 	The top priority is teaching and learning. 83.3% teachers had their files on their desks as required during lessons. 49% have students' planners AND teachers' files on their desks as required.	



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	85.9% of marking is in line with policy which is an improvement over the previous period.	
	A governor asked what procedures do you have in this area to improve these figures. LD I have a recording process for these drop ins and will speak with the appropriate head of department if a member of their department is not performing as required. These meetings have yielded an increase over the previous period now 85.9% although there is room for improvement.	
	A governor asked how the other governors feel about this. All agreed the work LD is doing is the right way to go and wants her to continue.	
	Priority 2 is to improve students' personal welfare and development.	
	All of these areas are showing green which is incredibly positive and something the academy is very proud of.	
	Priority 3 is to ensure student progress data is as accurate as possible and used effectively to maximise student progress.	
	The focus area is for HoDs to meet with their SLT Line Manager and discuss progress data according to monitoring calendar. To assist with this there is a lot of work taking place regarding what students are receiving intervention after the data is reviewed.	



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Agenda item	A governor asked how many times is the data gathered. LD once a term and is staggered to manage workload. Priority 4 is to improve the success and popularity of the sixth form still further and ensure there are good progression routes through from KS3 to KS5 for students of all abilities. Focus area's are: A. Monitor vulnerable students rigorously, with clear review periods and targets. B. To ensure quality of teaching is consistently good across the sixth form. LD highlighted there is some updated data for priority 4 which will be shared. LD explained the support received from UCAS. All relevant sixth formers have had offers (some unconditional). Priority 5 is to develop leadership and vision across the academy. Positive work in this area focus is on Middle Leaders challenging any underperformance and referring up to SLT as necessary. LD overall the work done in these priorities is showing good progress and is working well. We're not complacent and will focus on the areas highlighted in the data.	LD to have shared updated data.

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	Educational Psychology Service This continues to be an essential service for the school and support for the SENDCo. Our EP (Dr Gavin Morgan) has seen 6 students so far this academic year and has completed supportive reports about each one. The reports either offer strategies for us to implement in school and/or back -up the referrals made to outside professionals. The waiting list for the EP now extends to May 2019. Referrals to the EP service are decided by SENDCO and influenced by a number of factors: evidence of need, staff concerns, diagnosis of other SEND (comorbid conditions), parental concerns and overall strategic support. On top of Educational Psychology Service we also offer the following support / interventions: Northants Referral Service. CHAT Counselling. Souster Youth. The Hub. Sensory Circuits. Handwriting Club English as an Additional Language (EAL). There are currently 34 students who have English as an Additional Language. This number may rise further (due to the number of students coming from the Corby area as those school are full) and we need to investigate some extra intervention to support their progress in learning English. For example, we are looking into possible support from the Trust and/or the Parents and Friends Association to buy translators. A governor asked if we record attendance of disadvantage students' parents / carers at parents evening.	



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	LD currently this is not done but feels this idea could help and will investigate to see if it can be done.

iii. Safeguarding	term exclusion. There were 20 exclusions of 18 different students so	
iv. Attendance.	only 2 students had a repeat exclusion. 4 DA students had exclusions totalling 7.5 days or 17.5% of the exclusions. This is a reduction in the proportion of DA students excluded. The main reasons for exclusions remain as assaulting other students or abusive behaviour towards staff. The team has tried to use shorter FTEs and the use of isolation instead. However, three separate incidents led to 5 day exclusions so the average length of exclusion has only fallen slightly.	
	Bullying There were 16 incidents of bullying in Spring 1, 8 verbal and 8 physical compared to 14 incidents in Autumn 2. Of the more serious incidents, 1 student was issued with an FTE for	
	repeated bullying and 2 others received time in isolation. Significant work has been done in light of some of these incidents to introduce and enforce a no - touch policy and to remind students of the work done in school to deal with bullying.	
	This was shared with all students in assemblies and with parents through a letter. The result of this work is that there have been many fewer incidents of injury or damage to students in	



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and Most segment of the segment of t	Spring 2, although the data is not yet available. Mrs Gonda continues to lead the student response to bullying, gaining a grant to set up the anti -bullying room and putting training in place for bullying ambassadors. According to Ofsted Parent View, 12% of parents do not feel that bullying is dealt with effectively at the school and 88% say their child feels safe here. There were no recorded incidents of cyber - bullying or of LGBT bullying in this period. This compares to 2 such incidents in Autumn 2. For next year behaviour to learning will be a focus. Safeguarding. One case going to court. One child on a protection plan. A governor commented the feedback from Ofsted highlighted the need for the safeguarding data to be tightened up. The work AK is doing with this is very positive. Attendance. The latest data shows attendance at Deswitch is an improvement. Persistence absence is lower than the national average. A governor asked if you have some parents who take their children out of school for holidays. D yes this has happened on some poccasions. A governor asked if there's a particular vear showing poorer attendance. AK no figures are consistent in all years.	



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	A governor asked if there are any examples of staff, students showing stress, anxiety regarding exams. There are a few members of staff who have sort support, advice. The students are generally calm which could partly be due to the support we offer.	
12. Ofsted Readiness. For information.	LD went through the latest SEF report. Improvements have been seen in: Quality of teaching. Department reviews completed with positive outcomes. There is good progress being made on free school meals. The area's of focus are: Teaching and learning. Homework. Behaviour. Welfare. Punctuality. A governor asked what actions are being taken in regards to teaching and learning / and is the SEF document shared with staff. LD teachers are monitored constantly with classroom visits occurring every three weeks / yes. LD shared a brief overview of the new Ofsted framework. A governor asked when do you think Ofsted will visit the school and when was the last time they visited the school. LD best guess would be after the next set of results. Last visit was November 2017. 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	A governor commented the school is in a good place with the current framework. The work that has gone in has the potential for PWS to receive a grade 2 Ofsted grading. Improvements can be seen with the work the governors have done recently.
